

Dear Friends,

I hope these beautiful autumn mornings find you keeping well.

Following on from David's update in last month's Hill & Valley, I am one of the 6 clergy within our new ministry team. I started my role as curate (trainee) last October, and look forward to meeting more of you over the coming months. As well as working in our parish, I also juggle part time chaplaincy work with older people, and at Naomi House & Jacksplace hospices for children and young adults. Previously, I enjoyed working as a small animal vet, before spending 3 years working with women in recovery from addictions.

The two days a week I spend as an Anna Chaplain is all about providing spiritual and emotional support for older people, and I spend a lot of my time visiting residents in two care homes. This year, in preparation for our Care Home Remembrance Services, I'll be interviewing 2-3 older residents who have memories of serving during WWII. It feels like such a privilege to be able to spend time with these amazing people and to hear their stories. My Grandparents all played their part in WWII, and my Grandpa also in WWI, but I'm just mindful that our children today don't have that direct link, and how important it is for us to keep the Remembrance alive for future generations.

And thinking about a very different type of battle, I'd also like us to remember somewhere in the region of 1,500 health and social care workers from up and down our country, who have so tragically contracted Covid-19 and died, whilst working on the pandemic frontline. Back in July at a Memorial Service in London, Sara Gorton said, "The hundreds and hundreds of dedicated NHS workers who died battling to save the lives of others must never be forgotten".

Please join us for one of our 'Services of Remembrance' held across our benefice on Sunday 14th November – details listed.

This time last year, the pandemic had stopped us from remembering the life, death and resurrection of Jesus through Holy Communion.

So, thank goodness for the words of St. Paul:



'For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.' (Romans 8:38-39)

Whilst we 'remember' this year, I urge us all to hang on to the words of St. Paul, and to the hope that they offer us.

THE WONDERING FIDDLERS

An International trio will be creating a joyful evening of accessible Early Music including works by Bach and Boccherini

Alberto Santa and Marino Capulli on violin and Elizabeth Elliott on Cello are a string ensemble who remove the barrier between the players and the listeners and engage in a dialogue on the meaning of the music they present. They formed with the goal of searching for an authentic way to perform early music, not just through historically informed interpretations but also through the choice of venue and interaction with the audience. Their aim is to take you back to the intimacy of 17th and 18th century with performances for the chamber, playing with replicas of historical bows. They have since performed in the UK, Italy, Kenya and Cuba, and taken part in such important festivals as Habana Clásica and Bach & l'Italia.

They are all tutors with the charity Early Music as Education (EMAE) based in Merseyside. Their shared love of early music and historical performance influences their choice of repertoire and use of copies of historical instruments. All ran incredibly smoothly, nearly 1100 visitors came, and we and the local businesses that joined us worked hard to ensure everyone had a good time. Several of the stalls, including the Hampshire Deli and Karina's Cakes, sold out of their wares very swiftly, Grandad's Fudge sold four times the amount of fudge he would expect to at such an event, and we sold 93 glasses of Pimm's! There was no entry fee, but visitors donated generously, so we're happy about that, too. None of this would have been possible without the volunteers who helped us with the planning, preparations and on the day, and we thank them wholeheartedly. Waterwheel Update

Our Crowdfunding campaign is going well but it looks as though we won't quite meet our target, so if you've been intending to donate and haven't yet done so, we'd be very grateful if you'd do so, and please also spread the word. A big thank you to those who have already donated so generously.

The platform and cradle that will support the waterwheel while it's being restored have been assembled and attached to the supporting walls either side of the wheel. They provide full access to the area via a boarded floor, secure lifting and proper support for the two-ton wheel assembly, and also access to the walls of the wheelhouse so we can do some repairs to those, too.

Dear Parents, Carers and valued members of the community,

As we go into a second academic year of Covid, and after all we have been through over the past 18 months, we reflect upon the start of the new academic year.

During this term, we continue our journey in developing our teaching and the opportunities for our children. Like many schools, we have been faced with many disruptions and challenges due to absence of children and staff alike because of Covid. Our school has been incredibly resilient throughout and the quality of provision for our children has not been noticeably affected. All children who are off school but are well enough to access lessons, can join their classes through remote connection or use our SharePoint system to access the work required. This has minimised the disruption as much as possible.

One of the most obvious developments on the school site now is the refurbishment of the SCOLA building. TALES FROM THE RIVERBANK: SUE AND TONY'S STORY - PART TWO

Part One of this article is in September's Hill and Valley.

Our wooded area had been heavily mown by the previous owners, but aside from cutting a few paths we left the grassy sections alone. The result has been beautiful orchids and an amazing abundance of insect life. Small mammals can hide in the undergrowth, while owls hunt along the paths. When managing the trees, we leave logs, stumps, and piles of chippings as habitat for moths, reptiles, hedgehogs, and fungi.

We also planted trees and mixed hedging in our main field, which we sub-divided in order to add a wildflower meadow. Nature has done her bit, with many new plants spreading on their own; the teasels are a delight and orchids have emerged along the riverbank. One of our simplest and most rewarding additions has been a muddy puddle – every morning in the summer we top it up, and the birds come down to collect their nesting material. It's an absolute joy to watch and costs nothing but a bit of time.

We want to do all we can to help wildlife, but have found that this is not a one-way street: owning the land is a privilege that gives so much back to us. Every little thing we've done has given us moments of real joy - a lizard basking on a bench and the grass alive with froglets, the flash of a kingfisher and the rustle of reeds as a water vole crosses the stream. The constant hum of insects alongside the flutter of tiny wrens, huge red kites, and our seasonal friends the swallows, swifts, and house martins.

One of the biggest lessons we've learned is that land managed for nature won't always look tidy - nettles and thistles aren't the most beautiful plants, but they provide fantastic food and cover for wildlife. It will also be a little unpredictable: our first season of wildflowers gave us the most amazing show, but last year's was dominated by just a few species. It's all a balance, and the reward for embracing this is small surprises; this year's has been cowslips.

Even looking back at all our progress, we know there is still much more that we can do. This winter we sowed yellow rattle in the woodland to suppress some of the more dominant grasses and help diversify our plant species. We plan to increase our current number of bird and bat boxes too. Our next big project is to try to create a large pond on an area currently used for grazing, then complement this with marginal planting, trees and hedges. Once it's in place, we'll wait to see who arrives! We know that not everyone has the opportunity or land availability to do what we've done, but in our experience the little things really do make a big difference. Research and advice can be invaluable aids; we had a visit with Maggie Shelton from the Wildlife Trust, which helped shape the plans for our pond. Whatever your circumstances, do what you can – you absolutely will not regret it.

"How much money do we have in the budget this year? Jan will know!" And "Oh no! It's broken! Quick, tell Mrs Torkington!"



or so far and any suggestions for additional events or activities. The main focus is on us getting together as a community to share friendship and fun and we want there to be something for everyone.

We thought we might also try to get a drone up to take a village photo of a mass gathering on the Rec

Sunday – Service of celebration in St Peter's in the morning (and possibly bell ringing too?) with street parties/picnics in St Mary Bourne, Stoke, Binley, Egbury and Wadwick as part of the Big Jubilee Lunch and maybe including our own local aspects of the Platinum Jubilee Pageant (dressing up and music could easily be in there and possibly more!).



Summary report from the **October** meeting of St Mary Bourne Parish Council

Cllrs Peart, Fullerton, Madge, Randall and the clerk attended the meeting. County Cllr Thacker, Borough Cllr Carr and one member of the public attended part of the meeting.

B&DBC CIIr's report - CIIr Carr reported that there are two vacancies for Governors at St Mary Bourne School. Interested people should apply direct to the school. He also reported on the Borough's future housing requirement which equates to 900 houses per year. This impacts on the Local Plan and the current StMB Neighbourhood Plan and the chairman planned to meet the B&DBC Planning Officer soon to discuss this and other matters.

HCC Cllr's report - Cllr Thacker reported that savings of £80 million were required over the next 2 years. He outlined various proposals of how the County Council could achieve this. It was also probable that Council Tax would increase by approx. 4%. Various outstanding highways repairs and footpath matters in the parish were discussed. Cllr Thacker admitted that there were faults in the county council website which recorded and tracked direct notifications and these were being addressed. The parish council and parishioners could report matters direct to him if they weren't satisfied.

Flood & Emergency Group/Lake - River bank restoration work near the lake would be carried out within the next few weeks. A full cut of the lake surrounds and tree work would be carried out during October.

Highways - The PC was hoping to find a local contractor who could repair the Jubilee Light. Also someone who could source a new cover with frame to repair the manhole by the Cricket pavilion.

StMB Children's Play Area - Update - The steering group were looking for grants and engaging with schools and other childcare organisations.

Sustainable Bourne Valley - A report had been presented to the meeting and circulated to councillors. A copy could also be requested from the Clerk.

Light TouchSaving the Planet

In all the doom and gloom of the climate news it is easy to feel helpless,

anxious or to just switch off as it is all too overwhelming. These light touch articles started in 2011 as part of the church's environmental scheme suggesting small things, we could all do to lessen the harm done to our planet. This year's attention to soil health, avoidance of peat and more self-sufficiency all help to lessen our personal carbon footprints. Recent research indicates that private gardens in Britain cover an area bigger than all the country's nature reserves combined, estimated at over 10 million acres. When you consider the enormity of our environmental issues, it can feel as though one garden won't matter. Recent research states that there are still 83 million gardens in the UK so our small actions will add up.

But we do need Governments to legislate to achieve major change and one action this autumn is vital. Boris Johnson brought out his new strategy on 19th October in time for COP26. This year is special as it is the first time the leader of every nation on earth is being invited and assisted to attend as opposed to sending representatives. This is because it has become very obvious that agreements made in 2015 in Paris are not going to keep global warming under 2 degrees, let alone 1.5 degrees. It is essential that from this time on, the whole world must work together and help each other. The UK in an independent report was recorded as having made some progress: coming second in the world with a rating of "almost adequate"!

Habitat improvements for St Mary Bourne's chalk stream

The beautiful Bourne Rivulet is an iconic feature of the valley which shares its name. This precious chalk stream is particularly special: being a winterbourne, it ebbs and flows in sync with the seasons due to its reliance on our county's chalk aquifer. This quality makes it a naturally dynamic habitat, with as much value in its dry phases as in its damp ones.

Over time, however, certain stretches of the stream have been altered from their natural form. This has left them vulnerable to excess sediment and loss of the plants that would usually provide wildlife habitat and protect against bank erosion. Now, one stretch in St Mary Bourne is being helped through the Watercress and Winterbournes scheme.

Where the stream runs alongside the village lake, we're undertaking improvement works to reduce sediment deposition, stabilise the eroded banks, and establish native aquatic marginal plants. This will help to keep the gravelly bed clear, minimise future erosion, improve water conveyance, and create habitat for species such as water voles.

These works are taking place with the kind support of local riparian landowners and shouldn't cause disruption for village residents. Postcard from Binley November 2021

Sometimes you could be forgiven for thinking the entire countryside is held together with baler twine. Take an amble around, it's everywhere. Gates are kept shut or held open with it. Rickety fencing is secured with it. The gizmo that holds the split pin to the thingamabob on farm machinery runs on it, trousers are held up by it and scruffy terriers walked on the end of it. It pairs a brace of pheasants together and tools are hung from nails in sheds with it. Here in Binley there is a proliferation of fuchsia pink baler twine. Driving down a lane you'll catch a sudden flash of it in a hedgerow as you would the azure of a kingfisher. When ratting you are told it is vitally important to tie the bottoms of your trousers tight with baler twine to prevent a rat running up the inside. Despite nearly forty odd years knocking around the countryside I've yet to see this happen and to say I'm disappointed would be an understatement. Not to me of course but to some other poor soul! It's quite one thing to put a ferret *down* your trousers but altogether another to allow a rat up 'em! I shudder at the thought of it.

I was delighted to have been contacted by a number of people in relation to last month's "postcard" regarding favourite sticks and the length of time they've owned them. I'm pleased it's not just me that sees their sentimental value. Peter Corbett stopped me to show me the stick he carries around on his mule every day which he whittled when he was fourteen. Others have their father's or grandfather's sticks. I suppose there is something very tactile about wooden objects or "treen" to give them their correct name. It's warm, nice to handle, comforting even. There was a chap, Paul was his name, who lived at "Old Lawn" in Binley. A dead ringer for Clark Gable and many will remember him. He was a regular in the Hurdlers Arms and an accomplished wood turner. He made me a beautiful pair of

candle sticks from some pear wood I had which reminds me, somewhere I have a small stool made from pear by Maxie Lane. What a character he was, long gone now and at one time his chain saw carved furniture was all over this valley, exchanged for the cost of a few pints in the pub but I haven't seen anything in a while now.

The papers are having a meltdown over face to face doctors appointments or rather the lack of them. I had a telephone consultation booked for 6.30 the other evening with one of the practice nurses at Derrydown which I attended in my underpants and little else in the privacy of my conservatory. In my right hand was a fat cigar, in my left a large gin and held between my knees a big bowl of cheesy Wotsits. So much more preferable to sitting in that waiting room with all those ill people! I nodded sagely as I listened to the results of my recent medical MOT, discussed my diet in between sips and puffs and in general it was a convivial experience and I could answer the question about my weekly alcohol units without fear of squirming in my seat or looking shifty. What troubled me a little was the fact that the sugar free muesli I have endured for breakfast which tastes like horse feed is very bad for me? It's the dried fruit apparently. Too much sugar. Who'd have thought that? When you consider what's more likely to kill you, the hands of a deranged crack addict with a £300 a day habit or a dried apricot it all gets a bit perplexing.

My thanks this month go to Mrs Elizabeth Maclay for doing far more dogged research in to "Doodlebug Corner" than I did. It turns out that what fell from the skies in the summer of 1944 here in Binley was not a V2 rocket at all but a "Mistel", a cunning but ultimately unreliable method of bringing terror to these shores. There were a number of varieties but in its most successful form a Junkers 88 bomber was packed with explosive and strapped to its back would be a piloted fighter plane known as a "huckepack" (piggyback). This combo would take off and when near its target the fighter would release the Junkers via explosive bolts which would then fly on and ultimately crash and explode.

"On the 10th/11th August a Mistel that was on a mission to destroy shipping in the Channel became disorientated and flew too close to the English coast. Low on fuel it released its Junkers which flew on, eventually crashing in open countryside at Slade Bottom Farm in the village of Binley at 23.35 hrs. The force of the blast reportedly blew a man over almost three miles away." Probably Colin Chilton coming out of the George.

In further news I'm pleased to report that Graham Hamlen has been up to Binley with his impressive probe and actually found the Junkers remains! I bags first dibs on the tailplane!

A303/ Southside Road Enviropark Ash Storage

Raymond Brown together with Fortis their corporate owner were granted temporary permission at the start of the

pandemic to increase the size of the storage dump for bottom ash in the 'enviropark' on Southside Hill. They have now applied to convert temporary permission to a permanent enlarged dump.

Our Keep Test Valley Beautiful (KTVB) group which successfully defeated the incinerator project has done a lot of work on objecting to the current application which can be viewed on Hampshire County Council web site:

https://planning.hants.gov.uk/Planning/Display/HCC/2021/0545

More than 110 individual objections have been submitted by Longparish and Barton Stacey residents and by our own Parish Council. KTVB has employed a firm of planning consultants to provide a detailed professional report demolishing the Raymond Brown justification for the enlarged site. The principal points of objection covered in the report and by most of the individual and PCC objectors are these: The facility is in the wrong place. It is a potential hazard to the environment and to the health of nearby residents in Longparish and Barton Stacey. It contravenes five important national and local planning policies. The need for it has not been proven. (Objectors strongest point)

Many thanks to all those who have taken the time and trouble to send their objections to HCC. If you haven't objected and you would like to, there is still time - even though the official consultation deadline has passed, objections will be taken into account right up to the the determination date, which at the time of writing is unknown". 'Watch this space for further news on the progress of the application'.



THE FIELD VOLE

The field vole (also known as the short tailed vole) is very common in grasslands. There are estimated to be 60 millon field voles. Field voles are grey-brown above and grey below. It has shaggier fur than its close relative the bank vole and a short tail. They are active day and night running along a network of well used runs that lead to their burrow, Field voles breed rapidly, one female can produce as many as six litters of up to eight young in a single year. But most will not live long as they are a very important food sauce for a number of predators. Owls, kestrels, weasels, stoats and foxes are among the species that prey heavily on them. Their main food is leaves and grass stems.






